Welcome New Chancellor

USask Senate appointed the 17th Chancellor – Scott Banda. A USask alumnus, Banda has had a distinguished 32-year career, including 12 years as CEO of Federated Co-operatives Limited, and currently chairs the Canadian Football League's Board of Governors.

Banda is a lifelong supporter of USask and the community, recognized with multiple awards including the Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal for Industry and Commerce.

He succeeds Grit McCreath, who served as chancellor since 2019 and was praised for her strong advocacy and leadership. Welcome, Scott!

Academic Programs Committee

The Academic Programs Committee (APC) is well into a busy and productive fall term, with several important initiatives already underway.

Dr. Paul Jones, Associate Professor in the School of Environment and Sustainability, is the new Chair of APC. Nominated by Council, Paul brings a wealth of experience from his previous committee work, and his deep knowledge of academic governance is already proving invaluable.

This fall, APC officially launched its new submission forms and clarified the approval process for curricular changes and proposals. The updated, streamlined process is now available to the campus community via the Governance Channel in PAWS, under the <u>Curricular Approval and Changes Page</u> — making it easier to navigate academic program proposals and changes.

So far, APC has reviewed a number of proposals, including admission changes, new pathways, and certificate programs, with more expected in the coming months as activity ramps up. Nancy Turner also joined a recent meeting to provide an update on the new Assessment and Course Delivery Policies, which are currently under development and will be coming forward in the new year.

In addition to proposal reviews, APC members will be learning more about the USask Academic Program Review Process, gaining insight into how programs are evaluated and supported across the university.

Research, Scholarly, and Artistic Work Committee

The RSAW Committee has started the year with a clear sense of purpose and a continued commitment to supporting research and creative activity across the university.

Dr. Eric Lamb, Professor of Plant Sciences, has been nominated for a second term as Chair of RSAW. His leadership and deep understanding of the research landscape will continue to guide the committee's work effectively.

This fall, RSAW has been closely monitoring the research and funding implications stemming from recent leadership decisions in the United States. Members were reassured to learn that affected faculty and students are being kept informed and supported through these developments.

Looking ahead, the committee will be placing greater emphasis on the "AW" (artistic works) this year — a vital and vibrant part of the committee's mandate. This renewed focus aims to ensure that creative scholarship receives the attention and support it deserves.

At the upcoming November meeting, members will review the Responsible Conduct of Research Report, an important document that reinforces the university's commitment to integrity in research. The committee will also learn more about the Joint Governance Council in Academic Health Sciences and explore opportunities for collaborative use of RSAW infrastructure — a promising step toward more integrated and efficient support for research and scholarly work.

Teaching, Learning, and Academic Resources Committee

The Teaching, Learning and Academic Resources Committee (TLARC) is off to a strong start this year, with several exciting initiatives underway. Dr. Ralph Deters, Professor in Computer Science, has been nominated for a second term as Chair of TLARC.

One of the major areas of focus this year is the ongoing work and consultation around the new Assessment and Course Delivery Policies — currently known as the Academic Courses Policy. Members of Council can expect to see this updated policy come forward in the new year, reflecting thoughtful input, broad engagement and support from multiple committees of Council.

TLARC is also forming working groups to explore several important themes:

- Teaching Effectiveness
- ❖ Artificial Intelligence (AI) in Teaching and Learning
- Implementation of the Assessment Policy (in collaboration with APC)

These groups will help guide meaningful conversations and practical strategies in each area.

Looking ahead to November, TLARC members will hear a presentation from the College of Agriculture and Bioresources on their experience implementing microcredentials — a growing area of interest in higher education. Additionally, the Career Centre will join the meeting to share insights on upskilling and what employers are looking for in USask graduates, helping to align academic offerings with evolving workforce needs.

Governance Committee

The Governance Committee has smoothly stepped into the new academic cycle, keeping things organized and on track as always.

Dr. Susan Detmer, Associate Professor in the Department of Veterinary Pathology, has taken on the role of Chair, following several years of service as a committee member. Nominated by the Nominations Committee, she brings familiarity to the role.

This fall, Governance has been busy reviewing and advancing Faculty Bylaws from several colleges, ensuring alignment and clarity across academic units. The committee also worked diligently to fill a vacancy on the Nominations Committee — a task that took a few tries but ended in success!

Looking ahead, Governance will continue its work by discussing proposed changes to the Council Bylaws, helping to shape the framework that supports effective academic governance at USask.



Planning and Priorities Committee

The Planning and Priorities Committee (PPC) kicked off the academic year with great energy and a clear focus on key initiatives and university priorities.

Dr. Christian Willenborg, Department Head of Plant Sciences, has been nominated for a second term as Chair of PPC. His continued leadership brings valuable experience and consistency to the committee.

In early September, PPC hit the ground running with a recommendation to establish the BRIDGE Centre — an initiative designed to foster innovation and collaboration across campus.

Financial matters have been front and centre, with CFO Deidre Henne keeping PPC well-informed. She presented several key reports, including the Annual Financial Report, Strategic Investment Fund Adjudication (a refreshed approach to resource allocation), Q1 Financial Results, and a Financial Sustainability Update.

President Peter Stoicheff also joined PPC to outline the University's priorities for the year. These priorities serve as a guiding framework for the committee's discussions and recommendations.

Members had the opportunity to hear from Vice-Presidents Greg Fowler, Cheryl Hamelin, and Baljit Singh, who shared updates on their 2024–2025 progress and outlined their unit priorities for 2025–2026. It was a great way to stay connected with what's happening across the university.

We also welcomed Dr. Marjorie Delbaere in her new role as Acting Vice-Provost, Students and Learning. As the calendar turns toward winter, the committee is preparing for its busy adjudication period in December and January, when award decisions will be made to support and celebrate student success across campus.

The Nominations Committee has been actively supporting governance across campus this fall. Highlights include filling vacancies on Council committees and appointing a member to the search committee for the Executive Director of the Global Institute for Food Security.

The committee also completed nominations for sessional lecturers to serve on the Academic Programs, Planning and Priorities, and Teaching, Learning and Academic Resources Committees, ensuring broad representation in academic decision-making. In addition, nominations were prepared for review committees evaluating the Dean of the College of Nursing and the Dean of the Western College of Veterinary Medicine.

Looking ahead, the committee will continue to appoint members to upcoming search committees, and in the new year, a call for interest will be sent out for those wishing to serve on Council committees.
